VanHecke captures MDUSBC Masters

Defeats two-time defending champion Knowles in finals

Ryan VanHecke of Chesterfield remained in the winner's bracket and beat the two-time defending champion Justin Knowles of Okemos 475-402 in the final two-game match to win the Metro Detroit USBC Masters Tournament at Astro Lanes in Madison Heights Sunday. VanHecke claimed the title and the \$2,000 first prize, while Knowles settled for the second place check of \$1,000.



Van Hecke qualified seventh with a six-game total of 1,254. By virtue of qualifying seventh he was seeded into the second round as 24 players advanced to match play. In match play

he beat Daniel Jordan of Livonia 437-363, 2013 Masters champion Jeffrey Roche of Dearborn 418-374, Franklin Snodgrass of Centerline 444-412 before dispatching Knowles the first time 429-377 to remain the lone survivor in the winner's bracket. He then had to wait for Knowles to emerge from the loser's bracket. In the first match of the finals, Knowles got the best of him 512-372.

Once the players moved to another pair of lanes, VanHecke began with seven consecutive strikes, while Knowles had a hard time finding the line on the pair that he had earlier shot a 300. VanHecke stormed out to a 106 pin lead after one game 249-143 and never looked back.

"Beating Justin the first time put me in a comfortable position in case I was on a bad pair. This is what happened, which gave me a chance to redeem myself on the second pair." said VanHecke.

VanHecke averaged 212.8 for 18 games of competition. He was runner-up in the 2017 MDUSBC Masters to Andrew Anderson at Bowl One Lanes.



Knowles was seeded ninth by tournament rule, qualifying with 1,207. In match play he defeated James Koss of Brighton 418-309, Harold Sullins of

Chesterfield 437-351, 2015 Masters champion Corey Miller of Waterford 414-381 and reigning Michigan State Masters champion Nicholas Cooper of Flint 567-358 before falling to VanHecke the first time 429-377. He then came back to beat VanHecke 512-372 before eventually losing to him 475-402. Knowles averaged 217.8 for 22 games.

Lorincz qualified 11th with 1,225. In match play he lost his first match to Jacob Howell of St. Clair Shores 395-383, which made for a long day. In the loser's bracket he defeated Christopher Nielson of Livonia 399-372, Gerald Johnson of Taylor 446-405, 1999 Masters champion Joseph Krajenke of Clinton Township 445-380, Jeffrey Roche 417-399, Nicholas Cooper 435-412 and Franklin

He averaged 206.2 for 22 games of competition and took home \$700.

Snodgrass qualified sixth with 1,271 with a high game of 235. In match play he remained in the winner's bracket with triumphs over Jacob Howell 450-433, Krajenke 456-486 before falling to VanHecke 444-412. Once in the loser's bracket he beat two-time Masters champion Jeffrey Austreng of Waterford 424-374 before getting knocked out by Lorincz 424-415. He averaged 214.2 for 16 games and took home \$500.

Austreng qualified 13th with 1,219 and took home \$450 for his fifth place finish. Nicholas Cooper finished sixth

for \$450, Darren Alexander seventh for \$400 and Jeffrey Roche eighth for \$400.

Top qualifier Trey Raynes of Westland led the field of 81 bowlers with 1,314 with a high game of 290. In match play he lost his first match, then won his next two matches before losing and getting knocked out and took home \$350 for his 10th place finish

The MDUSBC Masters Tournament is a USBC certified event operated by the Metro Detroit USBC, the largest local association of the United States Bowling Congress with nearly 40,000 members.

Canadians capture Series Events

Mykaela Mitchell of London, Ontario won the Metro Detroit USBC (MDUSBC) Women's Series event with a 221-208 triumph over high school student Melanie Straub of Chesterfield at Thunderbowl Lanes in Allen Park. Mitchell took home the top prize of \$500, while Straub settled for 50 scholarship points.

Mitchell qualified fourth in the field of 32, with a four-game total of 850. After a slow start with 185, she surged back with games of 207, 247 and 211. In match play she beat Darlene Dysart of Southfield 235-185 and top qualifier Trisha Reid of Romulus 212-160 to advance to the finals.

Straub qualified seventh with 820 on games of 192, 212, 223 and 193. After she finished qualifying she thought she missed the cut, but made it. In match play she was victorious over second seed Madalyn Klein of Whitmore Lake 194-161 and last year's Cup champion Brandie Reamy of Livonia 216-202 on her way to the finals.

Michael Snow of Windsor, Ontario won the Men's Series event Sunday with a 210-172 triumph over Dan MacLelland of Kitchener, Ontario at Thunderbowl Lanes in Allen Park. Snow took home the top prize of \$500, while MacLelland settled for \$250.

Snow qualified third in the field of 50, with a four-game total of 911 on games of 267, 234, 208 and 202. He was seeded into the second round, but in match play he beat Conner Weber of Wayne 238-206 and fellow Canadian Darren Alexander of Essex, Ontario 210-193 to advance to the championship match.

MacLelland was the top qualifier with 954, including a high game of 279. In match play he defeated David Owens of Mason 229-172 and fellow Canadian Dylin Hunter of Tecumseh, Ontario 217-211 on his way to the finals.

Dylin Hunter seized the lead in the season long Cup race with 304 points, after previous leader Justin Knowles didn't compete.

Mitchell moved up into second place in the season long Cup race with 295 points, only one point behind leader Sheri Verespej of Newport.

Mitchell won the "Battle of the Series" by defeating Snow 188-151.

This year's tournament was dedicated to the memory of Ken Charrette and George Zainea. Both were past presidents of the association and remained on the board until their passing.

USBC Board of Directors announces contract extension for executive director Chad Murphy

ARLINGTON, Texas - Chad Murphy has agreed to a contract extension to continue as Executive Director of the United States Bowling Congress (USBC).

The agreement extends Murphy's tenure as executive director through the end of 2024. He first was named executive director in June of 2014.

"Through Chad Murphy's leadership, USBC has continued to deliver more new initiatives and greater value for our members," USBC President Karl Kielich said. "I am especially proud of the stronger relationships developed between USBC and our association leaders, as well as the bowling industry. The USBC Board of Directors has great confidence in the staff, and this extension shows our desire to continue this positive trajectory for years to come."

Reporting to the USBC Board of Directors, the USBC Executive Director serves as an officer of the corporation and has overall operational responsibility for staff, programs, finance and execution of the strategic plan.

Murphy first joined the International Bowling Campus (IBC) in 2010 as Director of Youth for the Bowling Proprietors' Association of America (BPAA). He became IBC Director of Youth Development in 2011, at which time he also assumed management of USBC's youth programs.

He is a former member of Team USA, and his playing honors include a silver medal at the 1998 World Tenpin Team Cup in Amsterdam. He also was part of the Ebonite Nitro/R's team that won two Grand Championships in the Brunswick World Team Challenge Series in 1994 and 1996.

The Michigan Women's 500 Bowling Club will be holding their 44th annual tournament on Saturday, June 6, 2020. The club will be going for the first time to Lapeer. The 500 Club will hold their event this year at Gerlach's Bowling Center. The 500 Club is a tournament, which can go to venues with fewer lanes. This tournament will be a great opportunity to visit a different area in the state.

The Michigan Women's 500 Bowling Club is open to any certified female bowler who has bowled a 500 or greater series in a certified league.

There is a \$5.00 club membership fee. For the fee, the member will receive a membership card, a club patch, and a club pin. There is an annual tournament held once a year in a different corner of the state. The Michigan Women's 500 Bowling Club is a member's only club and is not affiliated with the Michigan State USBC.

This year's tournament will feature two squads one at 10:00 am and another at 2:00 pm. The tournament entry fee plus dues for the season is \$23.00. The second squad can be added for an additional \$20.00.

The 500 Club Tournament offers a couple of special features: the tournament average is a composite average of all the bowler's certified averages, each participant can bowl in both squads, and is run in four average divisions. New this year the tournament is offering brackets. It has also been the tradition of the club to give a gift to each participant each year. The 500 Club is always looking for new and different ways to improve the tournament.

Entries to the tournament will be mailed to club members this month. Information to join the club is available by contacting the executive director, Ann Block at 313-292-6538.

The eighth annual Midwest Women's Tournament (MWT) will start May 23 and run thru June 28, 2020. The year's MWT tournament host state is Indiana. The tournament will take place in South Bend and Elkhart, Indiana. The team event will be held at Signature Lanes in Elkhart and is a new center to the tournament. The doubles and singles portion of the tournament will return to Chippewa Bowl in South Bend which hosted during Indiana's last round.

The tournament is open to all certified female bowlers. Each event is \$25.00 per person with an additional \$5.00 all-events fee. A scratch prize fund is available for \$10.00 per person per event.

Team USA member Nick Pate joins USBC Board

ARLINGTON, Texas – Nick Pate of Inver Grove Heights, Minnesota, has been elected as an athlete representative to the United States Bowling Congress Board of Directors.

Pate takes over the position held by former Team USA member Rhino Page, who stepped down to focus on new business opportunities within the bowling industry. Page has served on the USBC Board for five years.

"I appreciate the opportunity given to me by my fellow athletes to serve on the USBC Board," Pate, 25, said. "Bowling has given me so much, and I'm excited to take part in helping lead our sport in the future."

Pate was selected by the USBC Athletes Advisory Council to complete Page's three-year term, which runs through July 31, 2020.

USBC Bylaws, in accordance with United States Olympic and Paralympic Committee (USOPC) requirements as the National Governing Body of the sport, state at least 20 percent of the USBC Board must be comprised of Team USA athletes, who are to be elected by Team USA athletes.

Women's Championships survey shows all-time high satisfaction; event averages to be used in 2021

ARLINGTON, Texas – Satisfaction with the United States Bowling Congress Women's Championships is at an all-time high and, because survey results from 2019 participants show a majority favor using Championships Average as the entering average at the event, that change will take effect for the 2021 tournament in the Chicago area.

The survey also showed more than 91 percent of respondents plan to bowl the 2020 event in Las Vegas. The 2020 Women's Championships will be held at the South Point Bowling Plaza in Las Vegas from April 18 through July 6 and more than 4,500 teams already have registered.

The 2019 Women's Championships, the 100th edition of the event, was contested at Northrock Lanes in Wichita, Kansas, and was the first to be held in a bowling center since 2008.

For the survey, bowlers were asked if they would be in favor of using their Women's Championships average, instead of league average, as the entering average for the event. While the majority (53%) were in favor, an increase from last season (47%), the highest percentages came from participants in the top two divisions – Diamond (71%) and Ruby (64%). The Diamond Division is for bowlers who average 190 or higher, while the Ruby is for averages between 175-189.

With the majority in favor of using Championships Average, that change now will be put in place starting in 2021. The USBC Open Championships began using Championships Average for its event last year and a survey of participants to the 2019 event showed 87% either agree or didn't have an opinion regarding the use of Championships Average as the entering average.

For the 2019 Women's Championships survey, bowlers also were asked about the difficulty of the lane patterns and whether the lane patterns should be kept secret until after the event.

Regarding the lane conditions, 81% of bowlers agreed or didn't have an opinion as to whether the lane pattern was appropriate for the national tournament. As for keeping the lane patterns secret, 85% of bowlers agreed or did not have an opinion.

Overall, satisfaction with the event operations is at an all-time high with 84% to 96% of bowlers either satisfied or neutral when asked about key areas such as customer service, pace of play, online registration, event operations, schedule, lane conditions, and host city and venue.

Looking ahead to the move to Championships Average in 2021, bowlers will use their Women's Championships tournament average, for the most recent 27 games, as their entering average. The event will maintain the same division structure (Diamond, Ruby, Emerald, Sapphire, Amethyst, Topaz) but the average parameters will be adjusted to align with the use of Challenge averages.

For bowlers who do not have a qualifying Championships Average, their qualifying league average will be converted to Challenge using the appropriate Challenge Average Adjustment Chart that is available on BOWL.com/SportBowling.

The average range for each division will be posted when the 2021 Women's Championships rules are released, and coming soon, the Find A Member application on BOWL.com will show Championships Average for Women's Championships participants.

The 2019 Women's Championships survey was conducted between April 21 and Sept. 1, 2019. With 16,432 bowlers in the Women's Championships, 2,746 responses to the survey, and a confidence interval of 95%, it is estimated the survey has a margin of error of +/- 2%.

2020 Bowl Expo to host PWBA-PBA Mixed Doubles special event with live coverage on FS1

ARLINGTON, Texas – International Bowl Expo, the bowling industry's largest annual gathering, will host a special made-for-TV event featuring the biggest names on the sport's professional tours.

O'Keefe won her second consecutive PWBA Player of the Year title while Belmonte was the PBA Player of the Year for the fifth time in 2019. Each of the eight participants has won a major title in their career, with Belmonte having a record 11 career major titles.

"This will be a fantastic event for Bowl Expo attendees, the national TV audience and for our sport," said Colie Edison, CEO of the PBA. "The PBA Tour has seen tremendous viewership growth through our partnership with FOX Sports and this special event is a tremendous addition to the schedule. We appreciate the opportunity to partner with BPAA and the PWBA Tour on this."

FOX Sports and its family of channels are the television partner for the 2020 Go Bowling! PBA Tour.

The PWBA/PBA Mixed Doubles will have two semifinal matches, with matchups determined by blind draw. The semifinals will be one-game matches using the Baker format, in which the bowlers will alternate each frame. The first competitor on the team bowls frames 1, 3, 5, 7, 9, and the second team member bowls frames 2, 4, 6, 8, 10, with the winning teams to bowl for the title.

Patrick Allen, Marianne DiRupo make it through loaded national ballot to gain election to USBC Hall of Fame



Patrick Allen and Marianne DiRupo made it through a loaded national ballot to gain election to the United States Bowling Congress Hall of Fame in the Superior Performance category, USBC announced.

The USBC Hall of Fame committee previously elected Patrick Healey Jr. in USBC Outstanding Performance, Bob Learn Jr. in Veterans, and Andrew Cain and Jim Zebehazy in Meritorious Service.

The men's national ballot included repeat candidates Allen, Randy Pedersen and Mark Williams, returning candidates Bryan Goebel and Mike Scroggins, and first-timer Wes Malott, while the women's national

ballot included repeat candidates DiRupo and Tammy Turner.

The voters on the national ballot — USBC Hall of Fame members, USBC Board of Directors members and veteran bowling writers — can vote for no more than three of the six men, and no more than one of the two women. Candidates must receive 70 percent of the votes to be elected. If no one gets 70 percent, any receiving less than 70 percent but at least 50 percent return to the Hall of Fame committee where they must receive 70 percent of the committee votes in straight yes/no individual votes to be elected.

This year, I voted for Allen, Pedersen, and Malott for men and DiRupo for women.

USBC said in the release that both Allen and DiRupo fell short of the required 70 percent of the votes cast, but the USBC Hall of Fame Committee selected the two candidates for induction.

The situation again highlights what I believe is a flawed voting system, combined with a huge backlog of well qualified men due to the 2009 rule change that made a year as a touring pro equal to a year of USBC competition — Masters, Queens, Open Championships,/Women's Championships — for the 20-year participation requirement. This made many stars eligible for the Hall of Fame, and created the current backlog for the men. (A bowler also must be at least 40 years old to be eligible.)

For years now, I have believed all six players on the men's national ballot were worthy of induction and would have voted for all six if the rules allowed it. That they don't is illogical because it forces a voter to grade on a curve, choosing candidates based on who else is on the ballot, instead of simply whether a voter feels a candidate has met their standard for what a Hall of Farmer is.

I was part of the Hall of Fame committee for the new Madison Area USBC that was formed by the merger of the local men's, women's and youth associations, and one rule I pushed for that was adopted is that voters can vote for all of the candidates on the Distinguished Performance ballot if they wish. However, only a maximum of three can be elected from the ballot, to help keep our weeknight ceremony to a manageable size.

If more than three candidates receive more than 70 percent, the three candidates receiving the highest percentage of votes will be inducted. If no candidate receives 70 percent of the votes, no one will be inducted. Meritorious Service elections are done second and candidates are elected such that the total number of inductees is not greater than four.

(The one issue with having a maximum is that someone can get the 70 percent and not be inducted one year, then perhaps not get 70 percent another year, which would be unlikely but theoretically possible. The easy fix is to have someone who gets 70 percent but not be in the top three, be slated for induction the following year.)

USBC could easily use the same system but a higher maximum number of inductees, or no maximum.

Again, the bottom line in my reasoning is that as a voter I should be able to consider every candidate individually and decide whether they are a Hall of Famer, not have to weigh them against other nominees in a given year.

Imagine this Hall of Fame ballot: Don Carter, Dick Weber, Earl Anthony, Don Johnson, Carmen Salvino, Johnny Petraglia. Is it logical that you should not be able to vote for more than three of those all-time greats just because they are up against other all-time greats? Of course not. But that's how the rules are now.

I served on the USBC Hall of Fame Committee for five years starting with the elections for the Class of 2012, and I regret not pushing harder for discussion of the current voting system.

Allen, 49, won 13 PBA Tour titles, including two majors — the PBA World Championship in 2005 and the Tournament of Champions in 2009. The left-hander has earned more than \$1.5 million in his career, finishing in the top eight on the PBA money list six times, including leading in 2004-05 with \$350,740 that is second all-time to Walter Ray Williams Jr.'s \$419, 700 in 2002-03.

Allen was elected to the PBA Hall of Fame last year.

The biggest victim of the voting system continues to be Pedersen, a PBA Hall of Famer with13 PBA Tour titles that include one major, as well as a PBA50 Tour title. And he is that infamous solid 8-pin against Ernie Schlegel from 14 titles that include two majors.

Most telling is that when they rated the top 50 PBA players of all time a decade ago, Pedersen was 35th and Allen was 44th, and Allen's last titles came that season, while Pedersen already had won his last.

To be clear, I absolutely believe Allen belongs in the USBC Hall of Fame and voted for him this year; I just believe Pedersen (and others) do too.

DiRupo, 52, needed a medical exception to get on the ballot as she doesn't have the required 20 years and won't be able to get them. Bowling historian Eric Hartman put her nomination together and included documentation on the back problems that ended her competitive bowling career.

DiRupo, the PWBA Rookie of the Year in 1992, won eight titles that include three majors in her PWBA Tour career before it went dark in 2003. She also has one USBC Women's Championships title.

Prior to her stellar bowling career, she was on the South Carolina softball team from 1986-1989, leading the team in RBIs in her senior season. She was a four-time National Softball Coaches Association All-Region selection and earned a spot on the CoSIDA Academic All-America second team in 1989.

The 2020 USBC Hall of Fame Class will be inducted April 29, during the USBC Convention at The Orleans Hotel and Casino in Las Vegas.

Through 2019, there are 432 members of the USBC Hall of Fame — 223 in Superior Performance, 120 in Meritorious Service, 51 in Veterans, 22 in Pioneer and 16 in Outstanding USBC Performance. The USBC Hall of Fame was created in 2005 by merging the former American Bowling Congress and Women's International Bowling Congress Halls of Fame.

Delegates will vote to fill three open positions on the USBC Board of Directors. The USBC Nominating Committee, which may slate up to two candidates for each opening, set a slate of five candidates including Glenda Beckett, Palmetto Bay, Florida; Bruce Hall, Westborough, Massachusetts; Chrissy Lee, Tampa, Florida; Adam Mitchell, Centreville, Virginia and Tina Williams, Pflugerville, Texas.

The USBC Rules department busts some of the most common myths about rules and their interpretations

MYTH#43: Extra bowlers on the roster are substitutes.

BUSTED: A roster is comprised of regular members of a team. Extra bowlers on a roster are additional regular players. Substitutes, even assigned substitutes should not be listed on the roster.

MYTH#44: Lanes must be dressed before the league bowls.

BUSTED: USBC rules do not require lanes be dressed prior to standard league play. This is something the league should address when negotiating the contract for the season.

MYTH#45: A bowler must bowl before their absentee score can be used.

BUSTED: The league absentee score is used for a rostered bowler who is absent. If the bowler does not have an entering average in accordance with the league rules, the absentee score is 120 (Rule 105-e). A league may adopt a rule stating the vacancy score is used until a bowler bowls.

MYTH#46: No foul is committed if the buzzer or light did not go off.

BUSTED: A foul occurs when a part of the player's body encroaches on or goes beyond the foul line and touches anypart of the lane, equipment or building during or after a delivery. If the bowler does not release the ball, nofoul is committed. The players clothing and shoes are considered part of the body.

MYTH#47: I should not vote if I do not like any of the prize lists.

BUSTED: You do not have to accept any of the options, but not voting is not the answer. Your options are "YES or NO" for each of the prize lists presented. You should vote NO if you do not like the options presented. Unfortunately, most prizelists presented do not give a YES or NO option. Be sure to write NO on all prize lists submitted, showing that you do not approve any of the options. If you do not vote, the number of votes cast is decreased making it easier for one of the options to obtain a majority vote and be approved. For Example: The Prize Committee presents two top heavy lists for consideration by the league board of directors. There are 18 teams and four officers in the league. If everyone votes one of the options must receive 12 YES votes. If only 11 board members vote, one of the options must receive 6 YES votes.

MYTH#48: A playoff and a roll-off are the same thing.

BUSTED: A roll-off is conducted to break ties. A playoff is used to determine the league champion. For example, if there is a tie for the third segment, the tie would be broken by a roll-off. After the third segment winner is determined a playoff could be held by all the segment winners to determine the league champion.

MYTH#49: A league can adopt a rule not to add roll-off, playoff and sweeper/fun night averages into final average records.

BUSTED: Rule 113 requires these games be included in averages, when the American game of Tenpins is bowled. There is no option for a league to adopt a rule that these games are not counted in final averages.

MYTH#50: A vacancy score counts toward a legal lineup.

BUSTED: Neither a vacancy score or an absentee score can be used to meet the legal lineup requirement. Rule 105 states that a vacancy score or absentee scoremay only be used when a legal lineup is present. Therefore, actual bowlers must be present to meet the league legal lineup requirement. Aleague cannot adopt a rule allowing a vacancy score or an absentee score to count toward a legal lineup.

MYTH #51: The president's verification of the league account is the league audit.

BUSTED: The president verification of the league account is a monthly duty of the president to determine the funds deposited and the funds collected each month balance. The league finances must be audited at least once per season, per Rule 102c. This process is in place to provide checks and balances to protect league funds. The audit committee checks league records no earlier than one month prior to the league payout to verify league income, expenditures and balances. Audit Instructions and an Audit Worksheetcan be found in League Resourcessection of the Rules page on BOWL.com.

MYTH #52: All finger and thumb holes must be used when delivering the ball.

BUSTED: Gripping holes are not required to be used during delivery. A bowler who does not use the gripping holes must be able to demonstrate, with the same hand, that each gripping hole can be used simultaneously for gripping purposes. A thumb hole that is not used becomes a balance hole.

MYTH #53: A bowler using the two-handed approach cannot use a one-handed delivery.

BUSTED: A bowler using a two-handed approach is actually delivering the ball with one hand. Therefore, a bowler is not required to use only the two-handed approach. One hand may be used, provided it is the same hand used when executing a two-handed approach.

MYTH #54: League officers, including league managers, youth league supervisors and officials must have USBC membership.

CONFIRMED: Rule 102a-3 requires all league officers to have current USBC membership.


MYTH #55: A USBC Youth member can waive cash prizes and bowl as a member of a four-person team in adult leagues.

BUSTED: A USBC Youth member can never bowl on a team of two or more players that pays cash or bonds as prizes.

MYTH #56: If I paid membership in one league, I do not have to fill out a card for another league.

BUSTED: Not only must a card be completed for each league you bowl in, you should show your payment receipt or membership card to the league secretary as proof of payment.

Take Advantage of the Original Social Network



I had just moved to Milwaukee to begin a new job as editor of *Bowling Magazine*, the official publication of the American Bowling Congress. I had just turned 21.

Growing up, all I wanted to do was write about bowling. At age 15, I was hired by Alan Post to assist Joe Lyou in producing the *Pacific Bowler*, a weekly tabloid that averaged 24 pages and occasionally bulked up to 32 when advertising was strong. I thought that was my dream job, until the offer from the ABC came along.

In 1980, *Bowling* was written and edited by the ABC Communications Department, but outsourced to a design company for page layouts and printer preparation. So, as editor, my main tasks were to develop the

monthly storyboard, assign features that weren't staff produced, and edit stories once they were submitted.

On the day I started, the monthly editorial deadline was fast approaching. We needed to get the last of the copy to the design company right away. My first task was to quickly edit a short feature story that had been written by Chuck Pezzano.

I was familiar with Chuck's work because the *Pacific Bowler* ran his syndicated column. Alan and Joe felt it was important to have a mix of national and local news, as well as opinion pieces and columns, to engage readers and make them look forward to Fridays, when the paper was delivered to more than 100 centers in Southern California. In fact, the marketing slogan of the paper was, "Get the Friday habit."

My first contact with Chuck's column each week was during the proofreading process, when it had already been edited by Joe and typeset by Pearl Stevenson, the fastest and most accurate typist I've ever seen. By the time it got to me on a long strip of photographic paper, ready to be "pasted up" on blue-lined cardboard sheets, Chuck's column was in good shape.

So, imagine my surprise — no, make that horror — when I opened up the envelope containing Chuck's feature, unfolded it, began to edit it, and encountered an average of one typo for each two paragraphs. I had been taught that when one submits copy for publication, it should be "squeaky clean" — thoroughly fact-checked, and devoid of grammar errors and typos. Yet here was a story from one of my mentors... one of my heroes... littered with mistakes. And it wasn't just typos; the story itself needed some work.

Who was I, a wet-behind-the-ears upstart, to put a blue pencil to the work of a writer who already had attained iconic status in bowling? I took the story to my supervisor, Dave DeLorenzo, showed it to him, expressed my concern, and asked him what to do. I'll never forget his response.

"You're the editor," he said. "Do what you have to do."

So, I did. I fixed the typos, rearranged a few of the paragraphs and rewrote the conclusion so it tied in better with the lead. I kept Chuck's "voice" in the story, so the storytelling matched the byline, but the edited version barely resembled the original that Chuck had sent in.

It would be about three weeks before the magazine was printed and mailed out, and I recall thinking about my editing job, and what Chuck would think about it, at least once each day during that time.

About a week after the magazine hit homes in the East, I received a handwritten note from Chuck in the mail. "Thanks for fixing my story," he wrote.

Whew! From that day forward, I was honored and proud to call Chuck Pezzano not only a mentor, but a friend. In future years, we'd serve on various committees together, and I always learned something from him — whether it was about an old-time bowler, or a different way of telling a story.

I cherished the monthly phone calls we'd exchange through the years, often focusing as much on our families as on bowling.

It's hard to believe that we said our final farewells to Chuck five years ago. I have missed those calls more than he could ever imagine. And I will never forget the kind note he sent to a kid editor some 35 years ago.

The anniversary of Chuck's passing reminded me of the good deeds that one particular bowler does on an almost daily basis. Barry Asher, a member of both the PBA and ABC/USBC Hall of Fame, makes it a point to keep up with old friends.

Barry doesn't require an "excuse" for calling. It's just his way of letting people know he's thinking of them, and to see how they're doing. He doesn't have a set schedule or rotation; he simply gets out his phone and selects a few people to call each day.

Perhaps that's one reason Barry possesses a treasure trove of historical bowling information. Check out his archived appearances on Phantom Radio, and you'll hear some great stories about many of the bowlers many of us grew up watching on "Pro Bowlers Tour" every Saturday afternoon during the winter months.

I've often said that I've never attended a school reunion, but I went out of my way to attend a reunion of Southern California junior bowlers several years ago. Bowlers have always been my best friends, and I still keep in touch with several of my old junior bowling teammates.

If you haven't made an effort to catch up with old bowling friends, make this the year that you do so. If you've read this far, then it's safe to say that bowling is an important part of your life. Bowling is all about people, so take the time to re-connect with some of the people who have touched your life in special ways.

I've heard it said that bowling is the original social network. It was for Chuck Pezzano, it is for Barry Asher, it is for me, and it can be for you. Log on to Facebook and start searching.

PWBA opens registration for first four events; new member benefits, format in 2020

ARLINGTON, Texas – Registration for the first four events on the 2020 Professional Women's Bowling Association Tour schedule, including the 2020 United States Bowling Congress Queens, now are open along with PWBA member registration, which has added benefits in 2020.

The 2020 PWBA Tour kicks off with three events in the western United States, starting April 23 with the PWBA Tucson Open at Lucky Strike Bowl in Tucson, Arizona. It will mark the second consecutive year the tour makes a stop in Tucson, though in a different center.

The tour makes its first visit to Washington in more than 30 years for the PWBA Spokane Open at Lilac Lanes and Casino, April 30 through May 2, before a return to Steve Cook's Fireside Lanes in Sacramento, California, for the PWBA Sacramento Open on May 7-9.

The USBC Queens, the first major of the season, is set for May 13-19 at the South Point Bowling Plaza in Las Vegas, site of the 2020 USBC Women's Championships.

PWBA members will have added benefits in 2020, including special offers on bowling balls from PWBA partners. Additional benefits include \$100 entry-fee discount and priority entry to PWBA Standard events, a 30-percent discount on ShopPWBA merchandise, discounted practice rates at official PWBA Practice Centers, and much more.

PWBA membership is available to any woman who has a bowling average of 190 or higher in a USBC certified league. Bowlers who want to compete in a PWBA Regional event must have a 180 or higher average.

The PWBA format for standard events in 2020 will have 12 games of qualifying (two six-game rounds) before the field is cut to the top 32. Another six-game round will determine the top 12, who will bowl six more games to determine the top four for the stepladder finals. Last season, qualifying rounds consisted of eight games.
