It's Krajenke Back-to-Back in Super Senior Masters

Defeats top qualifier McCleskey at Woodhaven Bowl-A-Rama

Joseph Krajenke of Clinton Township won the MDUSBC Super Senior Masters title and the top prize of \$1,000 at Woodhaven Bowl-A-Rama in Woodhaven with a 247-220 win over Michael McCleskey of Southfield. McCleskey settled for \$500.

As the defending champion, Krajenke was seeded fifth by tournament rule with a five-game total of 1,056. He remained in the winner's bracket with victories over Ralph Meisner of Waterford 239-201, Michael Lucente of Warren 244-196, McCleskey the first time 278-227 and last year's runner-up Larry Walker of Garden City 244-225. He then had to wait for McCleskey to emerge from the loser's bracket. Krajenke averaged 230.8 for 10 games of competition.

McCleskey was the top qualifier with 1,195 and a high game of 289. In match play he beat Nick Cipiti of Clinton Township 257-160 before falling to Krajenke 278-227. In the loser's bracket he beat Cipiti the second time 223-171, Ed Halt of St. Clair Shores 185-178 and Walker 258-239 for the opportunity to avenge the earlier loss to Krajenke. McCleskey averaged 233.2 for 11 games.

Walker finished third for \$400 and Halt fourth for \$300.

Walker qualified third with 1,126. He won his first two matches over Arnie Goldman Warren 229-216 and Halt 236-139 before falling to Krajenke 244-225. He then lost to McCleskey 258-239 to end his day. He averaged 228.3 for nine games.

Halt qualified 10th with 1,065. In match play, he won his first two matches beating Tony Stipcak of Redford 202-181 and Jeff Suma of Clarkston 213-147 before losing to Walker 239-136. In the loser's bracket he beat Suma 181-169 before getting beat by McCleskey 185-

178. He averaged 197.8 for 10 games.

Edward Flowers of West Bloomfield won the special competition for non-qualifiers over the age of 70 with a 232-164 win over John Clinton of Allen Park. Flowers took home \$175 and Clinton \$150 for their efforts.

The MDUSBC Super Senior Masters Tournament is an USBC certified event operated by the Metro Detroit USBC.

Krywy and Kovalova win MDUSBC Men's & Women's Series events at Mayflower

Stephen Krywy of Sterling Heights won the Metro Detroit USBC (MDUSBC) Men's Series event with a 244-205 triumph over Keith Caldwell of Detroit at Mayflower Lanes in Redford. Krywy took home the top prize of \$500, while Caldwell settled for \$250.

Krywy qualified seventh in the field of 43, with a four-game total of 833 on games of 182, 265, 178 and 208. In match play he beat Dennis Johnson of Wyoming 276-232, Steven Kenyon of Grosse lle 205-196 and Ryan Land of Royal Oak 237-176 to advance to the championship match.

Caldwell qualified eighth with 828, including a high game of 228. In match play he defeated Mark Meinema of Zeeland 226-222, top qualifier Michael McCleskey of Southfield 205-202 and Lonnie Jones of Ann Arbor 233-226 on his way to the finals.

McCleskey led the field with 943 on games of 235, 253, 268 and 187. In losing his first match he took home \$75.

Kovalova took home the top prize of \$500, while Lambert settled for \$250.

Kovalova qualified fifth in the field of 37, with a four-game total of 893 on games of 215, 203, 225 and 250. She earned a bye in the first round, but once match play began she beat Jenna Pollak of Fraser 258-194 and Kasey Eaton of Wyoming 254-207 to advance to the finals.

Lambert qualified sixth with 858, which included games of 241, 204, 209 and 204. She also earned a bye

and then defeated Stacey Timmer of Wayland 195-183 and last year's champion Sheri Verespej of Newport 259-237 on her way to the finals.

Last year's Cup Champion Robin Orlikowski of Grand Rapids failed to qualify for match play.

Krywy defeated Kovalova 279-248 in the "Battle of the Series" match at the end of the day.

On behalf of the Board of Directors, Officers and Office Staff of the Metro Detroit USBC Association, I would like to extend holiday greetings to all of you. This is the time of year when we all enjoy family related activities, while celebrating the holidays in our own way, especially this year. I hope that this holiday season is a joyful one for you and your family.

MDUSBC TOURNAMENTS

The Masters will be held at Westland Bowl in Westland, located at 5940 N Wayne Rd. The date for gualifying is Jan. 16 with match play on Jan 17

The entry fee is \$150 with a first prize of \$2,500, second place \$1,250 and final match play spot pays \$300 based on 120 entries. Ryan Van Hecke of Chesterfield is the defending champion.

The field will be limited to the first 160 entries so it is critical for returning entrants to send their entry fee and blank in as soon as it is received.

The Senior Masters will be held at Mayflower Lanes in Redford, located at 26600 Plymouth Rd. The date for qualifying is Feb. 13 with match play on Feb. 14.

Robert Sloma of Jenison is the defending champion. The entry fee

is \$120 with a first prize of \$2,000, second place \$1,000 and the final match play spot \$250 based on 120 entries.

The Metro Detroit USBC will conduct Annual Women's & Open Championship Tournaments with both starting Sat., February 13 through March 21 at Super Bowl in Canton. Squad times are 12:30 p.m. for the first three weekends of the tournament and 8 a.m. and 12:30 p.m. for the final two weekends.

All events, team, doubles and singles, for both tournaments will be contested at the same site. Handicap is based on 90 percent from 230. Squad organizers of 10 or more teams are eligible for \$10 per team organized. Spots can be paid for by check made out to MDUSBC, VISA or MasterCard. The prize ratio will be at least 1 in 10 entries.

For the Women's Championship there are two average divisions (165 and under and 166 average and up). The cost is \$25 per person per event and a \$5 all-events fee. The Women's Championship is open to all female members of the MDUSBC who bowled at least 21 games in the 2019-20 season in the Metro Detroit USBC Association or have 21 games or more in the current season in MDUSBC as of the time of bowling.

For the Open Championship the cost is \$25 per person per event and a \$10 all-events fee. There is an optional scratch feature in all of the events at a cost of \$10 per person per event. The Open Championship is open to all members of the MDUSBC who bowled at least 21 games in the 2019-20 season in the Metro Detroit USBC Association or have 21 games or more in the current season in MDUSBC as of the time of bowling.

In the Open Championship bowlers can bowl as many times as they wish in the team, doubles and singles events. They can even bowl with the same exact lineup twice, but only cash once with that lineup. To bowl other times a team can

compete by changing two bowlers. In doubles the same two players can bowl together twice, but only cash one. In singles a bowler can only cash once.

MDUSBC MEN'S/WOMEN'S SERIES

The MDUSBC Women's Series has returned for the tenth season. The series is a scratch event for women only. In conjunction with the Women's Series will be the companion Men's Series in its second season.

Qualifying is four games and match play will be single-game single elimination to determine a winner. The competition is expected to last less than four hours.

The entry fee is \$45 (\$50 if paid on site) and first place will pay \$500 based on 24 entries.

The next event will be Sunday, Dec. 13 at 10 a.m. at Westland Bowl in Westland, depending on re-opening of bowling centers by the state of Michigan.

In conjunction with the five events will be a season long "cup" competition, where all competitors will receive points for each event they participate in. The top player in points will receive \$500 and the top 15 will cash.

Other events are scheduled for Jan. 10; March 14; and April 11.

These events will be held regardless of the number of entries.





Bowling has an official beer again as BPAA signs deal with Boston Beer Company

Bowling has had some form of "official" beer at times in its history.

The allure is obvious: Get big money from a beer company for exclusive access to bowling and bowlers.

Unfortunately, it's not quite so easy for a variety of reasons.

A key issue is the level of industry cooperation needed. Even if you can get BPAA, USBC, PBA and PWBA all on board together, the key thing any beer company would want is access to all centers, and BPAA doesn't include every center and it doesn't have total control its member centers.

And what does a center get if the money goes to BPAA or PBA or

PWBA? Some proprietors are hard to convince that there are benefits if money isn't going directly in their pockets.

Then there is the fact that alcohol laws are mostly by state, making something that might work in some places not work in others.

At times over the years, I've been involved in helping run tournaments and learned the painful fact that in Wisconsin it is against the law and/or violates distribution deals to give a beer company the one thing it likely wants for a big sponsorship: exclusive access, even if only for the weekend of a tournament.

I'm not sure if what I saw then is exactly how it is now (or is in any other state), but it was such that a center can give deals and promote a beer, but it can't close down sales of other beers it offers.

(Wisconsin has a complex three-tier alcohol system involving beer and liquor producers, distributors, and retail sites, and a lot of complex and contentious regulations.)

A lot of this is why beer giants like the makers of Budweiser (now part of InBev) and Miller (now part of Molson) haven't really been involved in big sponsorship deals with bowling: Why pay big money when there is little to gain and you already available at pretty much every center?

But that isn't necessarily the case with alcohol companies below the giants, where access to more centers is a valuable carrot that can be dangled in a deal.

That seems to be the case with the deal announced in a news release Wednesday between the Bowling Proprietors' Association of America and Boston Beer Company that makes the parent of Sam Adams an "Official Partner of Bowling."

Boston Beer also includes Truly Hard Seltzer, Angry Orchard Hard Cider, Twisted Tea Hard Iced Tea and Dogfish Head.

All of those brands will come to BPAA centers across the U.S., and I'd wager that there are a significant number that do not carry some or all of those brands now — I know there are many I go to where I don't see Sam Adams beers (I don't consume the other products).

"The Boston Beer Company is the perfect partner to take us to the next level," Jim Decker, president of the Bowling Proprietors' Association of America, said in the release (no link available). "Their diverse portfolio of beers, ciders, teas and hard seltzers enables us to provide a wide variety of options for our customers. This, coupled with their best-in-class training and vast resources, just scratches the surface of why we're so thrilled to have the Boston Beer Company as our official partner."

BPAA said it plans to leverage the new partnership in many ways, including through marketing resources and programs initiated by Boston Beer.

Terms of the deal were not disclosed, but BPAA presumably will earn some much needed funds amid the COVID-19 pandemic and, speaking as a craft beer drinker who likes some Sam Adams beers, it will be nice for centers to offer more good choices.



"We couldn't be more excited to partner with the BPAA and bring Boston Beer products to thousands of bowling centers and drinkers throughout the country," Scott Hempstead, Senior Director of On-Premise Sales for the company, said in the release. "We look forward to growing our partnership and finding new ways to grow the beverage category at bowling centers, especially as the entire industry and specifically the on premise recover and grow from the effects of COVID-19."

15-year-old, 2-handed lefty Eric Jones breaks record as youngest to win a PBA Regional title

Eric Jones won the PBA Oklahoma City Southwest Open on Sunday to become the youngest ever to win a PBA Regional at 15 years, 263 days.

The 2-handed lefty who doesn't turn 16 until Jan. 17 ran away with the win, averaging 231.38 and going 8-0 in match play as he finished 310 pins head of Shawn Maldonado, according to the results of the 66-player tournament.

Competing on the Mike Aulby 39 lane pattern, Jones fired games of 225, 205, 232, 247, 234. 192, 243 and 227 for 1,805 in qualifying, then 228, 269, 205, 212 and 244 for 1,158 in the cashers round, and 230, 235, 266. 227, 236, 257, 218 and 227 for 1,896 in match play.

Wesley Low Jr., another 2-handed lefty, previously was the youngest to win a PBA Regional when he won the PBA Non-Champion West tournament at South Point Bowling Center in Las Vegas on March 29, 2013, as 29 days shy of age 16.

However, Low's record came with an asterisk in my book since it was a non-champions tournament.

Hall of Famer Pete Weber at 17 in 1979 was the youngest to win a PBA Regional open to PBA champions.

As a non-member, Jones won't be credited with an official PBA Regional title, which continues to be the dumbest rule PBA has: If you win a PBA tournament you are a PBA champion. Period.

If you're not a member, you just shouldn't qualify for any of the perks members get in winning.

But you won the title. Period.

Our Centers Need Their Own Bowl-A-Thons

We learn new things about the COVID-19 virus every day, but one thing that has been apparent since the very beginning of the pandemic is that it is especially deadly to those with preexisting conditions.

That certainly proved to be the case with Cloverleaf Family Bowl in Fremont, Calif., which shut down at the end of business on Sunday, March 15, two days before Alameda County ordered virtually all businesses to close as pandemic panic set in.

Cloverleaf already had been living on borrowed time, the victim of a predatory developer who wanted to raze the center in order to build luxury condominiums. Just three years remained on the center's lease, and although efforts had been made to get Fremont's City Council to intervene,

citing the center's value to the community, the countdown essentially had begun.

If it sounds as if we're describing Cloverleaf as we would a person, that's because, in a way, it was to its generations of customers.

"We've always taken the 'Family' in 'Cloverleaf Family Bowl' seriously," says Mike Hillman, who operated the center with 2016 BPAA Proprietor of the Year Jim Chambers for years.

Sitting in his office, its walls overflowing with civic awards and memorabilia, Hillman reflected on what had made Cloverleaf Family Bowl among the most successful centers in the country.

"The secret here has always been how we treated people, but it wasn't a conscious thing," he says. "We really do consider the people who come through our doors to be important. We know that people don't have to go bowling. But if we provide the right environment, people will come and be loyal."

"Loyal" certainly is a good word to describe the center's senior clientele, which packed the center several days a week. Cloverleaf also had a strong adult league program, and perhaps the best youth program in California, encompassing both leagues and tournaments. The center's best-known event for kids was the Hillman Memorial Scholarship Tournament, an annual adultyouth "Swiss" team competition that always rewarded the youth bowlers with scholarships worth more than their entry fees — a feat accomplished by rounding up lots of local sponsors and boosters.

Over the years, that tournament awarded more than \$700,000 in scholarships.

About 835 miles away in the Washington community of East Wenatchee, the residents are similarly passionate about their bowling center, known as Eastmont Lanes.

Ted and Barbara LeRoy operate The Suds Shack Soap Company in East Wenatchee. "I practically grew up at that bowling alley," Ted says of Eastmont Lanes. "My parents bowled league there. My mom got us in a youth league. I loved that place then and I love it now. It's part of what gives East Wenatchee that small-town feel."

Like so many centers forced to shut down during the pandemic, Eastmont has been hanging on by a thread. Proprietor Michelle Baugher operates the 16-laner with a lot of help from her father, Tim Bowers, from whom she purchased it in 2015. As the mandated closure dragged on, Michelle was forced to take on another job to make ends meet.

The bills kept coming in, but the center was not allowed by Washington Governor Jay Inslee to reopen, even at reduced capacity. With 30 years of experience either running or helping out at the center, Bowers knows the business inside and out. He cares about the customers — whom he considers friends — and says he believes he and Michelle can keep them safe.

"We have a 15,000-sq.-ft. building with plenty of room for people to separate," he notes. "But the health department told us if we tried to open they'd go to liquor control and try to have our license pulled. There might even be a \$10,000 fine. We've been able to hold on, but we can't hold on with no revenue forever."

East Wenatchee is one of those communities where if everybody doesn't know everybody, they know almost everybody. Word about the plight of Eastmont Lanes was getting around.

"The league bowlers knew what was going on," Bowers says. "And so did the families that depend on us for birthday parties — Michelle does a great job with those — and the companies that have Christmas parties with us. The electric union here in the valley filled the center with 275 people for one party shift and 275 more for a second shift."

Michelle also devotes a great deal of time to working with special-needs individuals. The Sunshine League, which meets each Saturday when the center is allowed to be open, is the highlight of the week for most of the participants — and for Michelle as well.

Nobody — not the league secretaries, the birthday moms, the company party organizers — could envision their community without a bowling center, or without this particular bowling center's operators.

"Those were the kind of people who came in and basically said, 'What can we do?' They didn't want this place to go away, and they didn't want anybody else running it," Bowers says.

As ideas began to be tossed around by league secretaries and a few other center regulars, one of the bowlers came up with the concept of a "Save the Lanes" event. It was impossible — indeed, essentially illegal — to conduct a "typical" bowl-a-thon on the lanes, so the idea focused on what could be done outdoors. Specifically, in the center's parking lot. The week-end of Aug. 29-30 was selected.

The centerpiece was a community yard sale. As word spread, donations came in — enough to fill the center's concourse. Then on the day before the sale, with the weather gods cooperating, nearly 50 volunteers set up displays in the lot.

"When we opened up at 8 o'clock Saturday morning, there must have been 400 people waiting," Bowers recalls. "The [adjacent] Safeway and Bimart parking lots were full, and some people parked a quarter-mile away at the Little League park and walked."

Specific prices were not assigned to any of the items. People simply made an offer, and if it was reasonable, it was accepted. Hardly any were not reasonable. Bargain hunters quickly came to understand the purpose of the event.

A silent auction was conducted inside the center, with the number of people allowed in at any one time strictly monitored. Back outside, donated hot dogs, chips and sodas were sold as "combos" at a suggested price of \$5 — but some folks paid \$20 just because they wanted to help. A local bakery contributed buns, even though it had been struggling for its own survival.

Some people simply made cash donations, including one man who dropped off an envelope that contained ten \$100 bills. "I sure miss having breakfast here," he told the owners.

The organizers figured that between \$10,000 and \$15,000 might be raised if the weather was good. When all was said and done, the event had generated \$29,743.65.

"That's this community," Bowers says in wonderment.

That's also the "magic" that bowling, bowling centers, and bowling center owners provide.

"It has meant something different to everybody," Mike Hillman says of Cloverleaf Family Bowl. "It's amazing how many people had their first date, their first kiss, or met their spouse here. One woman said that her mom and dad had met in a singles league here, got engaged at a New Year's Eve party here, then got married here."

Adds Hillman with a smile: "I'm just hoping she wasn't conceived here. Then she mentioned she'd had her own baby shower here last year."

Those are the types of stories that define the bowling experience, an experience that governors in too many states — Michigan included — simply do not understand.
