William Kazmierski claims Senior Masters

Stays in winner's bracket and beats Mitch Jabczenski in final match

William Kazmierski of Pinconning beat Mitchell Jabczenski Sr of Novi 456-430 in a two-game title match to win the Metro Detroit USBC (MDUSBC) Senior Masters title at Indian Lanes in Wyandotte and take home the top prize of \$2,000. Jabczenski settled for the runner-up check of \$1,000.



Kazmierski qualified 20th with a six-game total of 1,253. He remained in the winner's bracket with triumphs over 1993 Masters champion Terence Dockery of Fraser

526-366, 2015 Senior Masters champion Glenn Pilon of Trenton 397-371, Richard Wayne of Westland 490-422, three-time Senior Masters champion Harold Sullins of Chesterfield 460-426 and 1999 Masters champion Joseph Krajenke of Clinton Township 456-373 to wait for a challenger to emerge from the loser's bracket. He averaged 224.3 for 18 games of competition.



Jabczenski, the 2009 Michigan State Senior Masters champion, qualified seventh with 1,328. He stayed in the winner's bracket by defeating M i c h a e I McCleskey of

Southfield 520-423, Thomas Fauls of Troy 449-385, Jeffrey Kendall of

Clawson 407-344 before losing to Krajenke 434-391. In the loser's bracket he defeated defending champion Troy Stus of South Lyon 449-405, Sullins 435-401 and avenged the earlier loss to Krajenke 465-420 for the chance to win the title. He averaged 221.5 for 22 games.

Krajenke qualified 30th with 1,201. He remained in the winner's bracket until the end with victories over Kenneth Wyatt of Sterling Heights 424-414, 2018 Michigan State Senior Masters champion Michael Calvin of Warren 517-418, 2017 Senior Masters champion Bradley Gray of 444-384. Farmington Hills Jabczenski 434-391 before falling to Kazmierski 456-373. In the loser's bracket he lost to Jabczenski 465-420 to end his run. He took home \$750 and averaged 211.8

Sullins finished fourth for \$500 after being the top qualifier in the field of 112 with 1,422. In match play he beat Michael Kereluk of Warren 423-412, Edward Mintz of Canton 437-436, Troy Stus 557-431 before losing to Kazmierski 460-426. In the loser's bracket he triumphed over Gerald Johnson of Taylor 468-448 before being knocked out of the competition by Jabczenski 435-401. He led the competition in average with 229.7.

Johnson finished fifth for \$400 and averaged 226.4. Stus finished sixth for \$400 and averaged 219.9. Gary Schluchter of Fremont, Ohio ended up seventh for \$350, averaging 218.7 and Gray took home \$350 for his eighth-place finish, averaging 213.6.

The entire field averaged 192.8 in qualifying with the top 32 averaging

Daniel Mayer 213. The match play average was of Waterford 212.5.

Top games of the tournament were 300 by Kazmierski and Sullins, both in match play.

Reports were given from the President and Association Manager. Also reports from the Awards, BVL, Bowl For The Cure, Finance, McKay, Nominating, Tournament and Youth committees.

Elected to new two-year terms on the MDUSBC Board are Richard Banks, James Horton, Patricia Klix, Stephen Krywy, Martha Marshall and John Vorpagel.

Delegates to the Michigan State USBC Annual meeting are George Bresinski, Michael DeRousie, Patricia Klix, Anita Maiorana, Carol Roberts, Kurt Suokas and John Vorpagel.

The United States Bowling Congress annual convention will be held from April 29 – May 2 in Las Vegas.

During this time delegates elected from their respective local and state associations will vote on legislation affecting leagues, tournaments and bylaws in addition to electing three new members of the board of directors. Additionally there will be several workshops to inform the delegates about happenings at USBC.

Representing the MDUSBC at the annual convention will be Richard Banks, Ann Block, George Bresinski, Michael DeRousie, Shane Ferris, Libbi Fletcher, Mark Hurttgam, Vera Johnson, Patricia Klix, Michael Lewis, Martha Marshall, Jessica Tyler, John Vorpagel and Doug Williams.

Anyone else that would like to be appointed a delegate please contact the MDUSBC office.

Each year the Metro Detroit USBC Association selects deserving individuals for a number of year-end awards. Those awards include the Secretary of the Year, Coach of the Year and Volunteer of the Year. Selections are made from the nominations received from anyone who sees a deserving person from within the association. All applications are due to April 1, 2019.

To be eligible for Secretary of the Year a person must be a current league secretary in the MDUSBC. To be Coach of the Year the coach must be a current youth coach in the MDUSBC.

To be considered for Volunteer of the Year a person must be a MDUSBC Board Member or Officer; or Association Representative Coordinator or Association Representative.

The MDUSBC will award up to eight \$1,000 scholarships this year to male and female youth bowlers. Applicants must be at least 14 years of age and can only win once.

The scholarships are a result of funds raised from the past two Michigan State Tournaments held within MDUSBC that are restricted for this purpose.

Applicants must write a minimum 100-word essay about their future educational plans and submit a completed application signed by their coach.

Applications must be submitted to the MDUSBC office by April 1, 2019. Applications can be obtained by calling the MDUSBC office or visiting www.mdusbc.com and clicking on forms.

The excitement of high school bowling



If you haven't been in a bowling center during High School bowling, I recommend that you do so and you will see how great the Future of the Sport is. Recently, we had MHSAA Regionals around the state at 25 locations, all bowling on the "Allen" pattern, named after Randy Allen, who helped spearhead high school bowling to become a varsity letter sport. The atmosphere at Richfield Bowl, where my son bowled, was electric from the git go. Team spirit was overflowing as the young men and women prepared for the start of team competition. Six Baker games followed by three regular games of bowling, with the top three teams in both boys and girls divisions, advancing to states in their respective class. After the 15-minute warmup, the noise in the building went to another level as the teams gathered together to "yell" out their team chants. The atmosphere is something I wish I could bottle up and deliver to most adult leagues, in the hopes everyone will remember how excited they were as kids when they got involved with the sport. It's really captivating, and it's days like today, that I am proud of being in this industry, to provide the arena in which these young adults can participate in a life long sport, experience the camaraderie of playing a high school sport, and create the memories and friendships, that I'm sure will last for a long time.

Now, the talent varies quite a bit, due to those kids who grew up in a youth league, to those who just recently picked up the sport, realizing they don't have to be the fastest,

strongest athlete in this game. Even the caliber of coaching is wide ranging, with most being a parent of a child on the team. The kids however, only know that they are there having a great time, and sharing the school spirit, to either pump up their teammates, or to try and intimidate their opponents. The competition is fierce as the young adults try to navigate the "sport pattern", with spares being at a premium. The excitement in the air brought goosebumps as I recollect on my bowling career, those moments where it was tough to breathe, and the nerves were on overload. There were moments of greatness on the lanes, as well as agony of defeat. But in the end, great sportsmanship was had by all, and most of these athletes can't wait to do this again next year.

My hopes are that we as an industry, find more opportunities like high school bowling, to provide for our young adults, in the hopes that they cherish the friendships as many of us have known through this wonderful sport. If any of you have been looking to find something that you can be a part of, in the positive development of young adults, I encourage you to get involved with high school bowling. Our sport needs leaders who can teach the game and develop these kids into great young bowlers. Today was a good day as my son's team qualified for states! The Michigan State Senior Tournament takes to the lanes in May at Town-N-Country Lanes in Westland. This year marks the 54th annual open championships and the 44th annual women's championships. Entries are available and fillable on the Michigan State USBC website. The competition is run in doubles and singles and is divided in age classes. Doubles classes are determined by the age of the youngest partner. Entries fees for each event are \$18.00 and allevents is \$4.00. Age is determined as of April 1, 2019. The winners of all age classes in all-events is eligible for the USBC National Senior Championships. The senior tournament is open to all certified USBC bowlers age 50 and up. Three elected to PWBA Hall of Fame

ARLINGTON, Texas – Leanne Hulsenberg, Wendy Macpherson and Donna Conners will comprise the first class of the Professional Women's Bowling Association (PWBA) Hall of Fame in 16 years, following their election by the PWBA Hall of Fame committee.

Hulsenberg and Macpherson were elected in the Performance category, while Conners will go into the PWBA Hall of Fame in the Meritorious Service/Builder category.

Hulsenberg holds 26 PWBA titles and is one of only four to surpass \$1 million in career earnings.

Macpherson amassed over \$1.2 million in her career, 20 PWBA titles and five majors.

Conners earns her spot as the founder and Executive Director of the PBA/PWBA Striking Against Breast Cancer Mixed Doubles tournament growing it from 32 to 160 teams.

The 2019 PWBA Hall of Fame induction ceremony will take place May 15 in Wichita, Kansas, in conjunction with the 2019 United States Bowling Congress (USBC) Queens, a major event on the PWBA Tour. Details on the ceremony will be announced later

High School bowling 2.0



As high school bowling comes to a close this season I wanted to recognize those involved and bring awareness to so much more that can be done. Maybe you are like myself and you have a child that competes in high school bowling. Or you yourself competed in high school bowling. Maybe your local bowling center has hosted an event and there was no open bowling one day or your league night was even moved because of a high school bowling event. Right down to parents who don't bowl but their child does for their high school. So you have been going to the events and all the practices. Somewhere along the line I'm sure if you are a bowler, or not, you may have seen or heard about high school bowling this season. But how much do you know?

Like most high school activities it is a pay to play world now for kids. Sadly, bowling is no exception. Like other organizations fundraising is usually the way to go to build funds to participate. Fees can include but are by no means limited to lineage to the center, entry fees for tournaments, uniforms, equipment, travel and food to only name a few. Gas money and time are right up there if we were to keep going for sure. Nowhere in anything I just listed is the volunteers. Number one being the coaches. There are a select few schools that do pay their coaches a very small amount for their time but only a few. The vast majority of coaches do it simply for the love of the game and the future of bowling. Right along with the coaches are the volunteers, parents and others that

will help sell 50/50 tickets at events, transport the kids or work the door during the events that have a cover charge to attend. Again, another means to collect money for the kids to pay to play. People donating their time to help the team and the kids.

Then there are the bowling centers. Bowing centers are in business to make money, no doubt about that. What may surprise most people is that the lineage centers charge after all the practices, tournaments and meets equals out to well less than a dollar a game. This is done for many reasons. The hope is to make money in food and beverage excluding alcohol which is not permitted to be sold at high school events. That's the business aspect. Again, bowling centers are a business trying to make money. The other hope is to keep these kids interested in the game and hopefully they continue to bowl. Maybe even bowling an adult league at the same center they bowled high school in. Furthermore, maybe someday their kids bowl for high school and the whole thing comes full circle. Truly trying to help the school and the community while in essence, investing in the future.

I hope you finish reading this article and walk away thinking about how much some people are doing for this sport, the kids, their high schools and their respective communities. Hopefully it even inspires you to get involved. If it doesn't, then that's okay too. I myself am rarely able to watch my child bowl high school due to work. That's life. Maybe though, the next time you see one of these coaches, volunteers or you are in a center hosting a high school event you just give them a thank you? Whether that's a smile, a hand shake, purchasing something to eat or drink at that hosting center instead of bringing in your outside coffee, food or pop. Or how about just the words thank you themself? I'll never claim to have all the right answers but I hope I've given you a different perspective. Thank you to everyone that helps make high school bowling everything it is.

Ratings up significantly with bowling on FOX



The 2019 PBA Tournament of Champions viewership on FOX was up more than 75 percent over the 2018 TOC on ESPN, according to ShowBuzzDaily.com.

The 2019 TOC on FOX aired live at 3:30 p.m. Central time and drew an average of 1,131,000 viewers measured in 15-minute increments. That's up 75.6 percent over the average of 644,000 viewers for the 2018 TOC on ESPN, which also was a live show.

Viewership peaked at 1.3 million during the title match, PBA CEO and Commissioner Tom Clark said in a message.

Clark confirmed that that was the

highest viewership for a regular PBA Tour show since the 2010 Tournament of Champions, which was won by Kelly Kulick. That historic show had an average 1,765,000 viewers.

The special PBA Clash show on FOX on Dec. 23 had an average 1,768,000 viewers, the most for a PBA Tour show since 2005. That number deserves an asterisk, though, as that special non-PBA Tour title show followed FOX's early NFL window that Sunday for the slot that counted for that viewership.

PBA reported that through seven events, 12,281,000 viewers have tuned-in to watch the PBA on FOX, FS1 or FS2 including repeats, which is up 56 percent over last year's total audience through seven events of 7,891,000 on EPSN, and already is 13 percent higher than the total audience for the entire 2018 season on ESPN of 10,907,000.

The 2019 TOC figure is just for the initial live showing on FOX and does not include the numerous re-airings over the following week on FS1 and other FOX Sports outlets.

The cumulative of the live show and the re-airings is called the "Plus 7" in Nielsen terms, and has been where PBA has been seeing big benefits from its new deal with FOX vs. its deal with ESPN, which featured almost no reairings.

CBS Sports Network seals deal with Nielsen to be rated

One of the frustrating things about the PBA Tour, PWBA Tour and USBC shows such as the Junior Gold Championships that have been broadcast on CBS Sports Network is that there is no reliable way to know how many people watch them.

Of course since CBS SN is estimated to be in only 55 to 60 million households, well below the 86 million of ESPN, 84 million of FS1, and roughly 120 million of FOX, those viewer numbers aren't likely to be high.

But it still would be nice to know — and now that is something that will happen, as CBS SN is going to be rated under the deal signed earlier this month between CBS Corp. and Nielsen Holdings, which Mark London reported on in The Bowling News.

As Adweek.com reported, the CBS-Nielsen deal of Jan. 11 actually ended a standoff between the two companies since the end of the year that had complicated CBS' advertising sales.

visit ww.11thframe.com and subscribe for more of Jeff Richgels posts The multi-year agreement means CBS Television Network, CBS Television Distribution, Showtime Networks, Smithsonian, Pop, CBS Sports Network and CBS' 27 owned-and-operated local television stations will continue to use Nielsen's Total Audience measurement services, Adweek.com said.

The story notes that Nielsen now measures SVOD (streaming video on demand), out-of-home viewing, mobile and OTT (over the top) media in its Total Ad Ratings metric, and through a new partnership with Google, YouTube advertisements are now part of Nielsen's mobile Total Ad Ratings.

When it was asked on the thread off the post of this story on my Facebook page if viewings of a DVR'd show after it aired counted in ratings, London posted this response:

"There are two newer separate measurements, Live Plus 3, and Live Plus 7. Over the last ten years, the DVR has been able to tell networks who is watching and when they are watching. With so many more channels and the way lifestyles have changed, watching a program as it is being shown (in real time) is not as common as it once was. Networks were a little leary at first, but now it's an industry standard. As the names imply, programs can get a little boost, first seen by 'The Office,' when it would see a noticeable increase in the Live Plus 7 rating toward the end of its run on NBC. Back 40-plus years ago in the era of four or five stations in your town/area, television shows used to be communal viewing. You got one shot to watch, then write your viewing choice in a diary and after a week, sent it to Nielsen. Now, about the only program watched by millions at the same time is the Super Bowl. But even it will get a nice boost by fans of the winning team the first few days as they watching it again. So by knowing exactly who is watching (by demographic group), advertisers can fine tune exactly who sees their commercials for the best potential ROI—return on investment. Could see a different variety of products in this summer's than in years past on PWBA and Jr Gold shows, now that Nielsen will tell CBS SN the detailed picture of exactly who is watching what."

Kulick repping on PBA Tour

It was nine years ago — Jan. 24, 2010 — that Kelly Kulick made sports history by winning the PBA Tournament of Champions, beating Hall of Famers Mika Koivuniemi and Chris Barnes in the stepladder finals.

Recently in Lubbock, Texas, Kulick is making PBA Tour history again — just not quite as momentous as at Red Rock in Las Vegas 9 years ago. (That is, unless there has been another female Tour rep I am not aware of.)

Kulick, a Storm staffer, is acting as Tour rep for Storm at the PBA Lubbock Sports Open at South Plains Lanes, Storm reported.

She is assisting PBA Tour Manager Jim Callahan in working with Storm and Roto Grip staffers, helping them with lane play, equipment selection, and also coaching.

That's what the Tour reps do for MOTIV, Ebonite and Brunswick, and truthfully it's really not that significant, which I mean as a compliment to Kulick.

After all, her resume exceeds many of the players she is helping this week. And when she isn't competing, Kulick is on the Team USA coaching staff and travels to assist with coaching seminars around the world.

I know I'd have zero issues consulting with her and listening to her ideas if I was a competitor this week.

"I am looking forward to the opportunity to expand my knowledge and education of the bowling balls while matching them to the players and conditions," Kulick said. "Being out here sparks my motivation for the upcoming ladies tour as well as contributing to the PBA Professional Staff."

In the first couple of weeks, my good friend Lennie Boresch Jr. of Kenosha assisted Callahan.



Thoughts About the PBA league and the Olympic Nightmare



I have to admit it: When the PBA League was introduced, I thought it was kind of gimmicky. It was pretty obvious that it was intended, in part, to fill some significant television time without spending a lot of money, which the PBA did not have to spend.

I'm not sure why, but with each passing year, I've found my interest increasing. I'm still not a fan of the Baker scoring system, but I understand one of the reasons it's needed. Other than bowlers and bowling fans of a certain age, who would watch a five-bowler team match that utilized traditional scoring on TV? Just keeping up with the score would present a challenge. So, I accept the Baker system as the lesser of two evils.

I think what has piqued my interest is the interplay among the players on

the various teams. Although they make their livings in singles competition, every pro has bowled on a team at some point, and team competition can be more intense because when you make a bad shot, you're not letting down just yourself.

Watching a player miss a single-pin spare to lose a singles tournament can be shocking. Watching the same thing happen in a team tournament can be excruciating. The player making the losing shot just wants to find a hole to crawl into, while his teammates are put in the position of exuding empathy when they're actually ticked off.

You're a league bowler. You know that's true.

In the leagues in which we bowl, we can maintain the same rosters for years, even decades, as long there's no league average ceiling that forces us to shake things up. (At the center where I grew up and then bowled as a young adult, the problem of a team going above the average ceiling was addressed by having an 875 League on Monday nights, a 910 League on Tuesdays, a 950 League on Wednesdays, and an Open League on Thursdays. Improving teams didn't have to break up; they simply switched bowling nights.) But in the PBA League, rosters change from season to season because the team manager may "protect" only three of their five players prior to the annual draft.

Don't think that doesn't cause some hard feelings. And don't think players who aren't selected in the draft don't take it as a personal affront. Michael Haugen Jr. was making a statement when he earned PBA50 Rookie of the Year and PBA50 Player of the Year in back-to-back seasons after being deemed "not good enough" for the PBA League.

Here are the important dates associated with the 2019 PBA League:

- * Monday, March 25 Selection of protected players.
- * Monday, April 1 PBA Playoffs point list finalized.
- * Wednesday, April 3 Draft declaration deadline (draft pool consists of the top 40 on the PBA Playoff points list, and eligible players must declare their intent to enter the draft).
- * Monday, April 8 2019 PBA League Draft.
- * Monday, April 15 Player trade deadline.

But first, the team managers must decide which three players they'll protect, and another factor that comes into play is ball company staff contracts. Is a manager who is affiliated with a specific ball company under pressure to select as many players from that company as possible, or are they obligated to put together the best team possible? Every manager must answer that question for himself or herself.

Here's a look at the eight teams:

- * Portland Lumberjacks (manager Tim Mack) Ryan Ciminelli, Wes Malott, Kyle Troup, DJ Archer, JoJoe Yannaphon.
- * L.A. X (manager Andrew Cain) Jason Belmonte, Stuart Williams, Martin Larsen, Jakob Butturff, Osku Palermaa.
- * Brooklyn Styles (manager Johnny Petraglia) Parker Bohn III, Walter Ray Williams Jr., Sean Rash, Matt O'Grady, Jason Sterner.
- * New York City KingPins (manager Carolyn Dorin-Ballard) Pete Weber, Marshall Kent, Sam Cooley, BJ Moore, Anthony Pepe.
- * Motown Muscle (manager Del Ballard Jr.) EJ Tackett, Francois Lavoie, Anthony Simonsen, Shota Kawazoe, Josh Blanchard.
- * Dallas Strikers (player-manager Norm Duke) Tommy Jones, Bill O'Neill, Rhino Page, Kyle Sherman.
- * Philadelphia Hitmen (manager Jason Couch) Dom Barrett, Tom Smallwood, Ronnie Russell, Matt Sanders, Chris Loschetter.
- * Silver Lake Atom Splitters (manager Mark Baker) Chris Barnes, Jesper Svensson, Tom Daugherty, Dick Allen, AJ Johnson.

Other factors a team manager must take into consideration are a player's state of mind, personal matters going on in their lives, and any physical ailments they may be dealing with. Age may also be a consideration, as it can be a positive (experience) or a possible negative (lower rev rate).

By following the PBA League from start to finish, I've found myself more engaged throughout the competition. And this year, it all begins with the protection of players on March 25.

If you are planning a trip to France anytime in the future, cancel it.

France is the country that will host the 2024 Olympic Games, and had the opportunity to name bowling as one of the sports it would recommend to the International Olympic Committee for inclusion in the Games, to be held in Paris
